Providers are earning their Child Development Associate credentials, becoming Medication **Administration Training** approved, and receiving new supplies and materials. In several cases, providers have increased their enrollments since joining Babies Step Forward.

At-risk children left out of quality prekindergarten are 5x more likely to enter the criminal justice system by age 27 than their peers in quality prekindergarten.

## Advocacy Update

### Protecting Every Child's Right to Quality Early Care

he Council fought hard to protect child care subsidy funding and the child care subsidy specialist position in the 2016 Westchester County Budget, and we were successful, once again. We're grateful to County Executive Rob Astorino and the Board of Legislators for their ongoing support.

Of course, with no increase in child care funding in the current State budget, we have much more work to do. Westchester children whose families struggle with poverty and other challenges are often not exposed to high quality early learning experiences – and by kindergarten, many are already so far behind that it will hold them back for an entire lifetime. And we continue to hear in our annual parent surveys that this is not only an issue for low-income families: even those at the highest income levels struggle to pay for child care.

We anticipate a very challenging 2017 budget. Year round, we keep the dialogue going at the county level through the Child Care Study Group, chaired by Deputy County Executive Kevin Plunkett and Board of Legislators Chairman Mike Kaplowitz, and at the state level through Kathy Halas's participation on the Board of Directors and Public Policy Committee of the New York State Early Care and Learning Council.

A grant from the Westchester Community Foundation will fund new advocacy materials, a survey on child care impacts on local employers, and a workshop on advocacy skills for child care leaders, all of which will help us prepare for the 2017 budget season and beyond.



At the 2016 Legislative Breakfast on Children and Youth, presented in partnership with the Westchester Children's Association, Westchester's NYS elected officials participated in an interactive discussion regarding child care subsidies, raising the age of criminal responsibility, and early childhood home visitina.

"As a single mom who goes to school and works tirelessly just to make ends meet, the scholarship is a blessing, relieved me of some of the financial child care burden, especially since I was denied for the DSS subsidy for making approximately \$100 over the income limit.

There is not a lot of support for families in my income bracket. We are pretty much neglected. It was impossible for me to afford \$800 a month. I actually had to pull my son out of daycare at a point and left to depend on friends and family members who weren't always dependable. I will forever be grateful for the Child Care Council's efforts to help people in my position and hope that one day I can be a financial investor and pay it forward."
